
Events in 2017

Writing About Contemporary Artists: Challenges, Practices and Complexities

20 - 22 OCTOBER 2017

This conference sought to nurture dialogue between a range of different artistic fields concerning writing about contemporary artists. The event brought together scholars and practitioners in fields including musicology, theatre studies, dance and choreography, literature, film, digital media, and the visual arts. Its 70 participants represented a strongly international delegation drawn from North and South America, Australia, South Africa, and across Europe and the UK.





Hybrid Human-Machine Computing (HHMC): From Human Computation to Social Computing and Beyond

20 - 21 SEPTEMBER 2017

The main aim of this workshop was to bring researchers in different disciplines but with common interests in HHMC together to promote interdisciplinary collaboration and innovative research ideas. It sought to identify concrete ways to sustain such activities by creating a long-term research network in the UK, Europe and globally. 63 participants from the UK, Germany, USA, the Netherlands, Italy, and China attended the event.

Chronic Stroke Rehabilitation: Exploring Technology and Neuromodulation Across Domains 26 JUNE 2017

This multidisciplinary workshop broght together clinicians, neurologists and researchers working in different domains, with the common purpose of using cutting-edge technology and neuromodulation in chronic stroke rehabilitation. This includes techniques such as transcranial direct current stimulation (tDCS) and virtual reality. The workshop concluded that these techniques show promising results for rehabilitation in chronic stroke patients across several domains.

Research Methods for Digital Work: Innovative Methods for Studying Distributed and Multi-Modal Working Practices

25 - 26 MAY 2017

This meeting focused on a key question for studies of contemporary work across disciplines: how can we combine methods or devise new methods to capitalise on diverse forms of data in order to build rich and theoreticallyfruitful understandings of digitally-suffused working life? We aimed to promote cross-fertilization of approaches across disciplines and to instigate conversations on the theoretical purchase offered by different ways of studying work.







Pregnancy After Bariatric Surgery: Optimising the Health of Mothers and Babies

20 - 21 APRIL 2017

The meeting aimed to develop an expert consensus statement for the management of conception and pregnancy post-surgery and to discuss research collaboration and grant proposals. It brought together expertise from a multidisciplinary group of researchers and clinicians (midwives, dietitians, endocrinologists, health psychologists and surgeons) from Surrey as well as national and international experts in the field.
